The West Mercia Police area and especially South Herefordshire remains low crime. That said a number of incidents have occurred and I would ask you to have a look at these to see if you could help with any information which may assist us in bringing the offenders to justice. General Policing

Between the above dates (23rd October - 25th November) there were 154 incidents reported to the police for the South Hereford Rural Area which were either, attended and dealt with by us, or response officers. 29 of these were "Grade 1", which means 999 emergency calls which is either life threatening or a crime in progress.

There were 17 crimes. These are broken down in to; 10 Theft, 0 Assault, 3 Misc, 1 Damage and 3 Burglary.

0133S 231015 Between 2045hrs 22nd October and 0500hrs 23rd October Containers have been broken into at Holme Lacy College, Chainsaws, Hedge trimmers and Strimmers have been taken.

The Cold Mornings are coming

Don't become a victim, read the below advice.



Although vehicle crime is low across
Warwickshire and West Mercia, cars are
stolen from driveways every winter because
owners leave them unattended, with the
keys in the ignition, while they warm up
and the windscreens defrost.

Some vehicle owners nip inside for just a few seconds to collect a bag or finish the last mouthful of coffee – but that's all the time an opportunist thief needs.

Insurance companies may not pay out for cars stolen in this way – and if your house keys are taken as well, you're making your home vulnerable.

Freeze out car thieves on frosty mornings:

- Clear windscreens with de-icer and a scraper
- Sit in your vehicle while the heater de-mists the windscreen

Do you know what Anti Social use of a Motor Vehicle is?

Read the below advice on anti social use of a motor vehicle and carless driving.

What is 'off-road'?



Section 34 of the Road Traffic Act 1988 makes it an offence to drive any vehicle on 'any common land, moorland or land of any other description, not being land forming part of a road, or any road being a footpath, bridleway or restricted byway' apart from some exceptions like to save a life!

If a vehicle is used in this way, the police can seize it immediately or they may serve a notice to the owner and driver/rider.

The notice warns all concerned that if the vehicle is used again in that way by anyone, on that occasion, it will seized.

It also warns the offending driver that if they drive or ride in the same way during the next year, the vehicle they are using may be seized - whoever it belongs to.

The law doesn't cater for a second warning!

Police advice on anti-social use of motor vehicles

The police have wide ranging powers to deal with people who use their vehicles in an anti-social manner. Apart from prosecuting offenders for motoring offences that could lead to being disqualified from driving, the police can also rely on a power to seize motor vehicles using Sec 59 of the Police Reform Act 2002. The keeper of the vehicle will be liable to recovery/storage costs when they eventually get the vehicle back.

This law applies to vehicles driven carelessly or without reasonable consideration on roads - and that includes car parks and other public areas - in a manner likely to cause alarm, distress or annoyance to members of the public.

Sec 59 also covers any such use of a motor vehicle off-road, such as common land, moorland, bridlepaths, footpaths, tracks and fields. An official complaint does not even have to be received by the police for them to enforce the law.







How to stay on the right side of the law

It's easy - just use your vehicle responsibly. Keep your driving safe at all times and don't bow to peer pressure and be tempted to mess about with the vehicle when driving or on car parks.

Sec 59 was written in law to stop anti-social use of motor vehicles. Effectively the law is there to stop inappropriate use of vehicles that annoy the public or place people at risk. It also stops offenders who disrupt the quality of life of others at homes nearby or when conducting their leisure activities (such as horseriding or rambling).

If you use a motorcross bike for off road scrambling - only do it on land with permission of the land owner and always walk or trailer the bike there, don't ride on footpaths or bridleways.


What is careless driving?

Previous cases in court demonstrate the type of activity that is considered 'careless or inconsiderate driving' contrary to Section 3 of the Road Traffic Act 1991:

- · overtaking on the inside;
- driving inappropriately close to another vehicle;
- · driving through a red light;
- emerging from a side road into the path of another vehicle;
- turning into a minor road and colliding with a pedestrian;
- using a hand held mobile telephone when the vehicle is moving;



- tuning a car radio when the vehicle is moving;
- reading a map or paper when the vehicle is moving;
- selecting and lighting a cigarette or cigar when the vehicle is moving;





- talking to and looking at the passenger when the vehicle is moving and causes the driver more than a momentary distraction;
- driving with a leg or arm in plaster;
- · driving under fatigue or nodding off;
- flashing headlights to force other drivers in front to give way;
- misuse of any lane to avoid queuing or gain some advantage over other drivers;
- unnecessarily remaining in an overtaking lane;
- unnecessarily slow driving or breaking without good cause;
- driving with un-dipped headlights which dazzle other drivers;
- driving through a puddle causing pedestrians to be splashed.



Think, does how you're parking effect others?

Can an Ambulance get through? As a Safer Neighbourhood Team parking issues are always a priority. Think about your parking and how it could affect others.

Your parking could be putting someone's life in danger



Don't let a Burglar think no one is home!

As the nights are getting darker earlier, burglaries tend to increase so leave lights on inside your house when you are not home. Leave a light on in more than one room. Use a timer if you have one. Make sure your front door is well lit. Police recommend dusk to dawn lighting that automatically comes on as it gets dark. Keep shrubbery and hedges at the front pruned to below one metre to remove cover for a burglar and allow visibility for neighbours. Keep your curtains closed at night, if you are away, ask a trusted neighbour to close them for you. Check existing lighting is in good working order and remember to check batteries in your torches and smoke alarms.
